APPLICATION OF THE INTERNATIONAL SCHEME FOR THE INSURANCE OF FOREIGN MOTORISTS AGAINST THIRD-PARTY RISKS

Letter from the Chairman of the Council of Bureaux

London, 4 January 1952

At a Meeting of representatives of Insurance Organizations held on the 1st and 2nd November 1951 in London at which the under-noted countries were represented the recommendations of the Sub-Committee on Road Transport were accepted in principle. These Organizations acting collectively are referred to as the "Council of Bureaux":

A standard form of Agreement was settled to be entered into by the Bureau, or ether corresponding organization, of each country with those other Bureaux with which it is prepared to have such an Agreement. This Agreement itself contains provisions to ensure that all agreements concluded in pursuance of the recommendations and of the international card system will always be of the standard form.

The existence of such agreements will be recorded centrally with the Council of Bureaux so that all Governments can be kept informed. It follows, therefore, that the Government of each country can now proceed to make the necessary arrangements to recognise the International Card as satisfying the requirements of its Compulsory Insurance Law. The introduction of any necessary Regulations and the signing of the Agreement by the Bureaux will bring into operation the recommendations of the Sub-Committee.

Arrangements have been made which will enable any Insurance Company established outside of Europe to take advantage of the system.

The Council have agreed that certain alterations should be made in the International Insurance Card to deal with questions which have arisen in the course of their deliberations. A copy of the revised card is attached (see Annex).

I must add that the representatives who attended this Meeting were under the necessity to seek confirmation by the bodies which had appointed them. I am glad to be able to say that this confirmation has been received from all, except that a final formal confirmation cannot be given by France until 14 January, and as regards Switzerland it is hoped to hear before the end of the month. A final reply has not yet been received from Luxembourg, and as regards Greece, where there is no compulsory Insurance, information is not yet available.
